God's Afterparty from Beata Abraham



Have you ever spent a sublimely impassioned stretch of time together with the people you love? The kind of time that engulfed your emotions and senses? Perhaps there was reflection about all that you mean

to each other, heartfelt apologies followed by earnest vows to be and do better in the future, delicious meals under the stars, dancing

to raucous music, recanting beloved tales and celebration of the special bond you share with each other? Needless to say, it probably felt

like a lot. Yet, in spite of feeling spent, when it was time to say goodbye you found yourself unready for the time together to end?

There is a Jewish holiday based on this exact feeling.

Most of us know that *Simchat Torah* is the day we celebrate the completion of the annual reading of the *Torah* and affirm the *Torah* as one of the pillars on which we as Jews, build our lives. But there is another holiday that is not so clearly defined: *Shemini Atzeret*.

Unlike most Jewish holidays, *Shemini*Atzeret doesn't commemorate a specific historical event or victory, or even have a clear set of traditions or activities we are supposed to engage in to celebrate. What it does have, is the confusing word, "Atzeret." While we know that *Shemini* means eighth, the problem with the word Atzeret is that we are not entirely sure what it means. Most likely this

word comes from the Hebrew word "atzar," a verb that is translated to mean to stop, to pause, or to hold back.

So why do we have this ambiguous day? The *Midrash* essentially tells us that *Shemini* Atzeret is like God's afterparty with the Jewish people. An extra day for God to hang out with us, while we process and recover from the aftermath of the revelry. Much like the day after vacation that is often needed to prepare yourself mentally and emotionally before returning to the familiar framework of regular life, God wants one more day with us, the

Jewish people, to be together. Just to chill.

The intense emotional rhythm of the holidays asks a lot from us. We throw a birthday party for

the world, summon the strength to forgive, pound our chests in regret for the error of our ways. We recall the misery of exile and the joy of redemption, building huts and with them model the importance of welcoming guests, not to mention – praying a lot! Shemini Atzeret is the welcome rest day we all need. A day to coalesce all we have struggled with and learned, and spend some time alone with God, no agenda required. It is a day to reflect on the knowledge that while the Torah belongs to the nation of Israel, it also belongs to each one of us in the most personal way. Yes, Judaism can be about a whole lot of symbolism, customs, traditions (and food!), but Shemini Atzeret is a reminder that rest and reflection are just as integral to nourishing our souls.

Besides, why would we turn down some quality time with God?

What do a wily Roman slave, a post-Impressionist French artist, a vengeful London barber, starcrossed lovers in New York City, and Little Red Riding Hood all have in common? They are all lead characters in hit Broadway shows

by Stephen Sondheim.

Beginning his career as a lyricist, collaborating with genius composers Leonard Bernstein (West Side Story) and Jule Styne (Gypsy), Sondheim quickly became successful writing both music and lyrics for hit Broadway shows including A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street, Sunday in the Park with George, Into the Woods, to name a few, and winning multiple Tony and Grammy awards, an Academy Award, a Pulitzer Prize, and more.

Sondheim was a true master wordsmith, infusing his songs with clever rhymes and playful turns of phrase that highlighted his commentary on the human psyche and frequently his own complicated relationship with himself and society. Equally gifted as a composer, Sondheim's music can be, at times, simple and singable, and at other times dissonant and rhythmically unsettling, keeping the audience on its toes (or, just as likely, off balance) but always enthralled and eager to hear what's next.

With that introduction, I'm excited to share the news of our annual fall concert, **Simply Sondheim**, on **Sunday, November 6**, at 4 p.m. Once again, we will bring together Milwaukee's top musical theater performers for a one of a kind musical review, this year featuring the songs of the late great Stephen Sondheim. Many of our performers are veterans of Skylight Music Theatre, as well as our annual fall concerts, including this year's musical director, Tim Rebers. Faithful CBINT concert-goers will remember Tim from our productions of Fiddler: The Untold Tradition (Perchik), King David (David), and Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat (Simeon) bringing the house down with his over the top rendition of "Those Canaan Days."

Our concerts are always a strong community and artistic event, as well as an important fundraiser for our congregation. I invite you to be one of the many song sponsors who help produce this concert and bring in essential funds for CBINT. 
