





A Message from Rabbi Alter: Remembering in Love



In the Zichronot-Remembrances section of the Rosh HaShana service, we celebrate God's boundless memory:

You remember the creation of the world and You are mindful of Your creatures since the beginning of time.

What the Mahzor claims for God, the James Webb Space Telescope demonstrates for astronomy: The galaxies that Webb revealed are 4.6 billion years old. Future images will show us what the universe

Before You stands revealed all that is hidden, and every mystery from the moment of creation.'

What's mind-bending about the Webb images is that they're of galaxies that don't look like that anymore, if they exist at all. They're now billions of years further along. We're seeing infrared light emitted long ago. The universe is that big; even at the speed of light, it takes a long time to traverse space.

The space telescope's value is unlike that of an MRI, or a Covid test – revealing what is

hidden *right now*. The Webb matters because we cannot know the universe today without properly understanding its history – the universe of long, long ago.

On Rosh HaShana, we celebrate God's infinitely specific memory in the spirit of accountability. It's tied to the language of confession. As God precisely remembers our deeds, so should we take a full accounting of our actions. Pretense and denial are pointless; God knows our full story. The only real option is to admit to ourselves, and to God, who we are and the path we've followed, and so to chart a proper course for the year ahead.

But the Webb complicates our recollections on Rosh HaShana, and with it our path of *T'shuva-Return*.

First of all, as the Webb's stunning images are actually ephemera – snapshots of a something fleeting, what are the recollections

of our deeds in the year gone by? Does our past *really* define us today? *So what*? that I did or said x or y or z in the past? Does that past moment define the present me? Am I meaningfully accountable for it?

We know that the answer is Yes. Certainly, wrongs we've committed must be righted. They cannot simply be shrugged away with, "What's past is past." At the same time, it's important to recognize that while the past is behind us, it informs the present through a process of evolution. Often, the past can only be engaged through the prism – the wisdom and refinement – of the present.

But there's something else, too. Take a look at the Continued on page 5

2. Second, spread the word. Mass emails from the synagogue are nice, but there's nothing like getting an individual or small group invitation from a friend. I'm looking for **10 people** to agree to reach out to their peers and encourage them to come. Let me know if I can count on you for this.

3. Third, and most important, **join my team**. I'm looking for **5–7 people** who will process the experience at the end of the weekend with me and Naomi and develop a plan to keep the momentum going. Our goal is not just to create an amazing weekend – which it will be – but to experience what amazing communal synagogue singing can be, and to make that what we aspire to achieve on a regular basis. **Can I get 5 people to sign up for my team right now?** We can do it, but not alone.

I love leading services. And I never tire of exploring new ways to engage people whether it's with new music, new prayer models (i.e., Shabbat in the Round, Campstyle Minyan, Family Services), or sharing new ways of understanding the prayers we sing. But it's a special treat to experience another master prayer leader at work, something I rarely get to do, and extra special when it means I get to share the experience with my community.

Have I mentioned I'm excited? I'm excited for Naomi Less to join us. I'm excited for her to share her music and perspectives. I'm excited for a wonderful weekend experience, and I'm excited for the potential the weekend has to move our congregation forward.

Insights from Beata Abraham: An Instagram Worthy Rosh HaShana



Perhaps it is just a matter of aesthetics, but I wonder why in spite of the fact that Rosh HaShana is such an important day in the Jewish calendar (which many Jews spend in selfreflection, repentance, and immersed in ten straight days of 'awe'),

neither Hallmark nor the retail world at large have co-opted this holiday in earnest. No light-up shofars, animated apples and honey, fish heads or Happy New Year banners to be found leading up to the big day. Of course, depending on where you live, you may come across a dusty box of matzah trotted out for display on the shelf of your local grocery store in a well-intentioned but out of context attempt to acknowledge Rosh HaShana, and also every other Jewish holiday.

As an antidote to feeling underrepresented, I encourage you to design your very own Instagram-worthy Rosh HaShana celebration, in a way that Martha Stewart can only aspire to achieve.

I have tried and tested a few ideas, keeping in mind that the only goal is to create joy and lasting memories. Martha will not be in actual attendance.

Apples and Honey Taste Test – apples and honey are not all created equal. This is the time of year when we all fall in love with honey again, so while this activity is nothing new, it is still worth repeating. To boost your honey game, procure as many types of honey as you can get your hands on (there are over 17, but this is not a reality cooking show so don't go crazy). Put out a variety of sliced apples to dip, add a voting method, and for a bit of extra flair: a blindfold. The honey with the most votes will receive the honor of the blessing for a sweet new year.

Rosh HaShana Craft Museum – Unearth those boxes filled with all of the glass and clay Rosh HaShana honey pots, hand-crafted Happy New Year cards, as well as the glued together apple-mobiles that the smaller humans in your life have ever made in or out of Religious School. Bonus if you can excavate your own childhood Rosh HaShana relics from days of yore. Pro tip: it is never too late to make some new Rosh HaShana crafts with children in your life. Cluster these items in a special mini-museum style display for all to enjoy. Heart strings will be tugged, guaranteed.

Birthday Party for the World – Rosh HaShana is not just a Jewish holiday. According to the Talmud, it is the birthday of humankind. Considering that the Universe is a pretty significant creation, a few cupcakes to commemorate this day hardly seem like too much effort. Whether you celebrate with a sphere-shaped cake frosted to look like planet Earth (I have actually done this), a candle on a single cupcake, or a Happy Birthday banner, let it spark a conversation about what each individual's part can be in making the world a better place; the ultimate birthday gift.

Rosh HaShana Tablescape – If you are thinking that the thought of coming up with, let alone setting, an elaborate table for RH feels beyond overwhelming, remember that you are going to want to eat at some point, so it might as well be at a striking and impactfully set table. An apple print tablecloth, a few carefully placed honey and/or bee-themed items, some laminated, handmade Happy New Year placemats, a small decorative tray or bowl with a mix of shiny real, plastic, or glass apples and pomegranates, a shofar or two as center pieces, can all go a long way. Use your imagination, but try not to google Rosh HaShana tablescaping, you will only scare

Zichronot-Remembrances section in the Mahzor (pp. 133-135): while it opens with a reflection on God's infinite and photographic memory, the verses it brings to extend the theme tell a different story. Every instance of God's memory cited here tells of memory as action.

In Biblical language, *lizkor-to remember* is not about recalling something that's fading into the past but is rather about being moved by another's need. It's about acting out of relationship. Think of the expression, "She remembered my birthday." We're not talking about an internal event. We're talking about an action.

God's boundless memory is about God acting out of love. God reaching out to those, like Noah adrift on the waters of a flooded world, or our ancestors mired in Egyptian slavery, who would be lost but for God remembering. There are even passages here that suggest that God remembers us better than we really are: a nostalgia that's rosier than the reality ever was. This, rather than the past as seen under harsh light of an unforgiving auditor, is what we mean when we talk about God's memory on Rosh HaShana.

As God remembers in love, so must we. We must look back on our own past year in love, confident that God will do the same. Accountability in this context is about rescue, not some terrifying punishment.

And what of the Webb's peculiar memory of a beautiful, early universe that is no more, yet is our very own universe? May its images help us perceive the beauty of the universe today. Help us intuit that what we cannot see from up close in today's world (and in our own souls) is no less beautiful, and that it (like our own souls) is in a constant process of change.

May 5783 be for us all a year of deep beauty and blessed change.

yourself with the endless possibilities. **Rosh HaShana Reflection Cards** – Of course there also needs to be a thoughtprovoking component to this holiday celebration. Rosh HaShana is a mini workout for the soul, so you should probably break an existential sweat by self-reflecting, soul searching, and resolution making. But like any good workout, it will transform, strengthen, and fortify you for navigating your daily life in the year to come.

Place on your table a stack of Rosh HaShana Reflection cards, for your family or friends to select from and answer aloud. What you write on the cards is up to you. It might be questions like: What were your biggest mistakes over the last year? Greatest achievements? What brought you the most joy? Which moments felt deeply meaningful? What have you resolved to do differently next year? Or it might be questions that you came up with yourself that only you and your participants will understand. Just make sure that each question can be answered by a responder of any age, and keep in mind that Rosh HaShana is



not just about looking backwards but is an opportunity to look forward as well.

Unfortunately, none of these ideas will guarantee that you will be written in the Book of Life, but then again, they can't hurt either. And it is always comforting to know that you pulled off an amazing and memorable celebration of one of the biggest holidays in the Jewish calendar, just in case...


