There's a Fiddler on Your Roof from Beata Abraham



"To match couples together is as difficult as the splitting of the sea," states the Talmud (or in a more modern analogy, as difficult as finding a parking spot in Midtown Manhattan).

How delightful to be surrounded by all

things red, pink, and heart-shaped during the month of February in America! Whether this month is a reminder to make a loved one feel special, or a reason to gorge on heart-shaped chocolates, it is also a perfect time to reflect upon the rich history of the ancient art of Jewish matchmaking,

The very first matchmaking attempts appear in *Beresheit*, in the form of an anxious father.

Avraham, who realizes that his son, Isaac, has yet to be galvanized by God's directive to "Be fruitful, multiply, and fill the earth." As any

doting father of a 40-year-old bachelor son, Avraham takes matters into his own hands. He designates his servant Eliezer as the *shadchan* for Isaac and sends Eliezer to *Haran* to find Isaac a wife to prevent him from marrying any of the local Canaanite girls. Eliezer creates a kindness test, which Isaac's future bride, Rebecca, passes with flying colors. Her brother, Lavan, dazzled by Eliezer's wealth, understands what a catch the eligible bachelor Isaac is and invites the servant back to their tent to seal the deal. The rest is history – *literally*. Isaac and Rebecca's offspring are Jacob and Esau, the progenitors of two powerful nations that still

exist today, making this a glorious matchmaking success story.

The long-practiced art of matchmaking is an ancient tradition, central to Jewish culture, and as old as Judaism itself. In Hebrew making a match is referred to as a *shidduch* and is considered a mitzvah. Traditionally, any member of the community could (and enthusiastically would) try their hand at matchmaking, thus becoming a matchmaker or *shadchan*. Often, when the amateur matchmakers (mothers, family members, friends, etc.) failed to succeed, a professional *shadchan* would be hired.

"Even the worst of husbands is better than no husband at all," advises a well-intentioned Yente, the old matchmaker in *Fiddler on the Roof.* And while she would be unlikely to get many clients with this attitude in today's postshtetl world, Jewish matchmaking continued to flourish in the shtetls of Europe. At a time when

> contacts between young Jewish boys and girls were restricted, if not forbidden, community involvement ensured that every Jewish single of marriageable age

would find a mate so that the community would survive and eventually grow. Making successful matches was a daunting and consequential undertaking, with the goal of compatibility often trumping our contemporary concept of love.

Alas, even modern ingenuity has failed to effectively solve the conundrum of how to get amazing people together with other amazing people, to make more amazing people, or to simply to go through life's tumultuous journey together. Global access has made it possible to look for a partner with the touch of a finger, generating more choices (continued on next page)

than our ancestors ever dreamed possible. Yet, for many, finding the right partner continues to remain elusive, occasionally frustrating, and often no less complicated than (as the Talmud perfectly puts it) the splitting of the Red Sea.

For those of us (myself included) who can't resist the urge to match others and remain undaunted by our dismal track record of successful matches, take heart. You are participating in a timeless tradition, and even an actual mitzvah. Keep in mind that you only need one successful union to earn the right to "naming privileges" of the offspring from your successful matchmaking efforts (it's the very least that the grateful parents can do, don't you agree?).

And for those still seeking their match, perhaps it is best to swipe a lesson from the Israelites as they fled Egypt. Unable to advance with the daunting, seemingly impassable sea before them, yet also unable to retreat with the Egyptians in hot pursuit from behind, they cried out to God in despair "What are we supposed to do now?" and God answered, "Why are you complaining to me? Get in the water, go forward!" So they did. They waded into the sea, and the waters parted before them to create a path. In taking this leap of faith, they changed not only their own destiny, but that of the Jewish people. Luckily, your stakes are not quite this high, but taking a leap of faith is often the best, and even the only way to go forward.

And of course, remember that those heart-shaped boxes of chocolates go on sale February 15. Because self-care through chocolate is also an ancient Jewish tradition.

Why You (Yes, YOU) Should Learn to Read Torah from Hazzan Stein



When I studied the art of reading Torah in Cantorial School, my instructor, Dr. Joshua Jacobson, made it his charge to train expert Torah readers, precise in music, phrasing, and diction, with a keen understanding of and care for the

finest details. And in his mind, expert Torah readers also meant being expert Torah reading teachers, taking his methods and helping others develop the skill of this centuries-old art form.

And, as you may know, I've taken this charge both seriously and joyously. It's such a pleasure for me to work with Torah readers, whether they are starting from scratch, returning to an old skill, or looking to fine-tune their proficiency. I have methods that I have developed over the years and enjoy tailoring them to each individual student's capability and learning style.

Much of my teaching is one on one, but by popular demand, I am starting a beginners Torah reading class this month. Starting on February 9, we will meet Thursday mornings right after Minyan (about 8:15 a.m.) and begin this journey together. I have a few people already signed up, but I think you, (yes YOU) should come too. And here's a few reasons why:

- Connect and engage with the Torah, the quintessential sacred text of the Jewish people, and connect with generations of Jews who have told the story of our people with this musical tradition.
- Learning to read Torah makes the Torah Service more engaging even when you are not one of the readers that week because you can understand and better appreciate what you are hearing and seeing.
- 3. It feels really good to learn a new skill.
- 4. It's fun to learn with other people :-)
- 5. And last but not least: You CAN do it!



Anita Bensman's Famous Hamentaschen Recipe

Single recipe

1 cup margarine

2 eggs

1½ cups sugar

4 cups flour

2½ teaspoons baking powder

2 tablespoons orange juice

1½ teaspoons vanilla

½ teaspoon salt

Quadruple recipe

4 cups margarine

8 eggs

6 cups sugar

14 cups flour

3 tablespoons & 1 teaspoon baking powder

½ cup orange juice

2 tablespoons vanilla

2 teaspoons salt



- 1. Mix wet ingredients.
- 2. Add dry ingredients.
- 3. Chill in fridge for at least 2 hours.
- 4. Place dough on a floured surface.
- 5. Roll the dough to a ¼ inch thickness.
- 6. Use your favorite glass top or utensil to cut out a 3 inch circle.
- 7. Place dough circles 2 inches apart on a greased or parchment lined cookie sheet.
- 8. Fill with your favorite filling (approximately ½ teaspoon).
- 9. Pinch edges to create the hamantaschen.
- 10. Bake, eat, and enjoy!

Personal Oven: 375 degrees, bake approximately 9 minutes.

Commercial Convection Oven: 375 degrees, bake approximately 6 min 10 sec.
