'Who knows better

than us what it feels

like to be strangers...'

Come As You Are from Beata Abraham



Imagine yourself a weary, bedraggled traveler in the desert of Be'er Sheva. You are equal parts famished and parched when you spot a sign of unexpected life in the distance: a most unusual tent featuring four separate entrances,

one on each flap, letting travelers from every direction know there is an ingress. The tent is surrounded by an impossibly lush garden filled with edible vegetation. As you approach, you spot an elderly man, seemingly immune to

the heat. He waves at you excitedly, urging you to hurry up and reach him. As you get closer, he hurries toward you impatiently with outstretched arms and a

warm smile, immediately insisting that you join him and his family at their table for a meal of delicacies and wine, which, after washing the desert dust off of your feet, he proceeds to serve you himself.

No, you have not stumbled upon the penultimate desert Bed and Breakfast. You have arrived at the very first Jewish home; Avraham's legendary tent, a non-profit oasis where the hosting was done on an epic scale.

Such was Avraham's commitment to being the living embodiment of hospitality that once, when travelers appeared in his midst, he excused himself from a conversation with God, and ran off to greet them;

"The Lord appeared to Abraham... He looked up and saw three men standing over him. On seeing them, he hurried from his tent door to meet them, and bowed down. [Turning

to God] he said: "My God, if I have found favor in Your eyes, do not leave Your servant [i.e., Please wait until I have given hospitality to these men]." [He then turned to the men and said:] "Let me send for some water so that you may bathe your feet and rest under this tree...."

Avraham's legacy of radical hosting has endured intact through the generations, and it is due to his legacy of hospitality that an open door to strangers has remained a core value of Jewish life. Even in the most difficult of times throughout our history, Jewish communities to this day have ensured that there was always an organization that provided food and lodging to travelers who entered their environs. Not to brag, but is it any wonder that when the Roman

> emperor Julian ordered the establishment of hostels

no stranger goes uncared for"?

for transients in the city he modeled the concept on the Jews, whom he recognized as people "in whose midst

There is a Midrash that tells the story of Avraham opening his tent to host an old man. After bathing, resting, and eating, the old man takes out several idols from his bag and begins to pray to them, thanking them for his good fortune in finding such fine hospitality in the desert. Upon seeing his guest praying to idols, Avraham becomes enraged and asks the old man what he is doing. The man responds that he is thanking his gods for the rest and food he has just received. Avraham, stammering in rage, says, "Your gods did not provide this food, drink, and shelter and respite for you. My God provided it and it is to my God – the One God – that you should be offering your prayers of gratitude." "You are wrong," replied the old man. "While I was traveling down the road, I prayed to my gods to

lead me to a place where I could find food and drink and shelter and rest, and they led me here. They answered my prayers and it is to them that I should be grateful." Avraham promptly kicks the old man out of his tent and sends him on his way.

Shortly afterwards, God asks
Avraham, "Where is the old man?" Avraham
explains to God what happened and his anger
and frustration at how, after receiving all that
bounty, the old man still rejected God in favor
of his idols. To this, God rebukes Avraham
saying, "For all these years, I have taken care
of that old man. Now you have the audacity
to toss him out? If his idol worship has not
bothered me, why should it bother you?"
Hearing this, Avraham is greatly ashamed,
and rushes down the road in search of the old
man. He finds him and apologizes, seeking his
forgiveness, and he invites him to return to his
tent and to his hospitality.

It is no coincidence that the importance of love for strangers is mentioned 36 times in the Tanach, versus the love for one's neighbor, mentioned only once. Perhaps this is because strangers often have outrageous views and practices that may be anathema to a host's sensibilities and values. A neighbor, on the

other hand, is far more likely to think and act like us, so we need the reminder to welcome them far less. Even Avraham needed to learn the lesson that each human being is invested by God with such dignity and value that to welcome and care for others is an even greater obligation than to rebuke them for their idolatrous practices against God.

Hachnasat Orchim (hospitality) is not always an easy thing to do. Just watch The Man Who Came to Dinner, a movie in which a guest forces his hosts to allow him lodging in their home and then goes on to overstay his reluctant welcome to the point of taking on the raising of the family's children as an extreme example of what could go wrong. But at the end of the day, who knows better than us what it feels like to be strangers, to be denied a place at the table because of our odd practices and beliefs (monotheism was once a brazen and abhorrent concept)? Yet, when we begin to see everyone as our neighbors instead of strangers, not only are we fulfilling a commandment, but our hearts widen and our ability to be compassionate and empathetic expands. As to whether it is the host or quest that benefits the most ... I encourage you to debate this over Thanksgiving dinner.
