Dance Like No One (Except God) is Watching! from Beata Abraham



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The Jewish people have a somewhat complicated relationship with the concept of happiness. We want to be happy ... but there's our iconic guilt. We want to be happy ... but there's our trademark angst. We want to be happy

... but we have a long history of tragedy and modern times are proving to be no less filled with heartbreak for our people. What are stiffnecked yet resilient people supposed to do to tap into that joy with which we are commanded to serve God on a regular basis?

The Declaration of Independence takes the importance of happiness as seriously as we do, even going so far as to codify our inalienable rights as human beings to life, liberty, and the *pursuit of happiness*. Judaism endorses this

message wholeheartedly. There are innumerable directives in the Tanach telling us to "Worship The Lord with gladness; come before him with a joyful song." And in case that message isn't clear enough, there is an abundance of Hebrew words at our disposal to express the spectrum of human joy. Let us hope that we are all

privileged to experience *ditza* – a sublime joy, *chedva* – the happiness of togetherness, or *rina* – refreshing happiness. The nuance is real, because happiness comes in so many different variants.

The pressure to be happy in the context of Judaism is both explicit and implied. In fact, the

Talmud tells us to be extra happy: "When Adar enters, joy increases." But how can the Torah (God) command us to channel an emotion on demand? Life is hard, so what happens if we are just not feeling it? Are we not fulfilling the happiness commandment if we are struggling with the sadness of a loss, or are simply mired in malaise during the month of Adar? Seems like God would understand the vagaries of human emotions well enough to know that they are not entirely under our control?

Rest assured that the Torah gets it. God gives us only those commandments that are within our control to fulfill; therefore it almost always addresses the realm of action rather than thought or emotion. We can choose to take action or not. We can be commanded not to eat pork, but it's impossible to command us not to be sad about not eating bacon (this might just be me). When we translate the adjective "happy" to the verb "rejoice," we understand that we do indeed have a choice in

> the matter of happiness. We can choose to do the actions that will cause us to feel the emotion.

"You shall observe the Festival of Sukkot seven days, after you have gathered in your grain and your wine; And you shall rejoice in your festival, you, and your son, and your daughter, and your manservant, and your

maidservant, and the Levite, the stranger, and the orphan, and the widow."

Perhaps, for some people, complete happiness is to be one with their couch while streaming Netflix (I may or may not be talking about myself). That is perfectly fine, but we all need to keep in mind

that that is not the way to live a life of joy in the way Judaism intended. The Jewish definition of rejoicing is to go out into the community to hold our celebrations and to find ways to include those who are less fortunate and lacking resources. It is the very act of participating in the celebration, of doing a kindness and helping others, that leads to the feelings of joy and happiness. Sure, happiness can be experiencing the hedonistic pleasures of a celebration like Purim, which are considered holy in their own right (the food, the wine, the singing, the ridiculously adorable children in costume), but it must also be about fulfilling the obligation to bring joy and sustenance to "the stranger, the orphan, and the widow." Therein lies deeper happiness.

J.D. Salinger was not wrong when he wrote "Happiness is a solid, joy is a liquid."





Let's enter the month of Adar paying full attention to the much needed reminder that it requires action on our part to fulfill the mitzvah of "increasing our joy." There are tools aplenty to achieve this increase; commandments telling us to celebrate, feast, drink too much wine. Plus, we get bonus points for doing good unto others (not to mention the gratification that organically comes with that). So pay attention to the Jewish calendar and the times of the year when the command to kick our rejoicing level up a few notches isn't just a suggestion but an actual requirement.

We are here, we are alive, and in spite of a past and present filled with pain and tragedy, we as Jews will never lose our capacity to rejoice. So let's show them how we do it – get out there and dance like no one (except God) is watching.

A Note from President Menachem Graupe – Rabbi Alter's Contract

As you may know, Rabbi Alter's current contract ends the summer of 2025, and that time will pass quickly. The current contract stipulates that by this May, the Board and the Rabbi should inform one another whether to pursue a new contract. The Board has already begun to gather input to make an informed decision.

As of this writing, a review committee has been formed. All synagogue members are encouraged to provide feedback through a questionnaire, and some of you will be asked to participate in a short interview. I am looking forward to hearing your thoughts. Based on the congregation's and the committee's input, the Board of Trustees will make its decision on whether to pursue a new contract for Rabbi Alter.
