### More Excited About CBINT Than Ever from Rabbi Alter



(Spoiler Alert: This essay is actually about you and CBINT's New SAC - Social Action Committee.)

What's the most Jewish space in your life?

- The tabletop or sideboard with your Shabbat candlesticks?
- Your shelf of Jewish

God hates

books?

- The bank app on your phone (or your checkbook) from which you give tzedakah?
- Your seat in shul?
- The lox display at Sendik's?
- Lunch with your BBYO besties?
- Ben Gurion Airport?
- Lion's Den Gorge, where you feel at one with God?

it more.' Among the most famous teachings in Pirkei Avot is this, from Shimon the Righteous (Ch. 1:2): The world stands on three things: on Torah, Avodah (service), and Gemilut Hasadim (acts of lovingkindness).

Judaism has never been reducible to a single essence. It's always a list:

Torah – learning what it says. Taking it, and ourselves, seriously enough to learn what Torah means, and to explore what it might mean to me, to each of us, today. Torah also has to mean commitment to a life of Torah. As the morning prayer says, "Instill in our hearts the desire to understand and discern, to listen, learn and teach, to observe, perform and fulfill all the teachings of Your Torah in love."

Avodah – service, or work. Did Shimon mean the system of sacrifices in the Temple? Likely. But maybe Shimon also meant work the way

we do. Making a living, putting food on the table and then washing the dishes, planting gardens, mowing the lawn, making lists and checking things off, finishing the basement. You know, work. Or maybe Shimon meant work in its broadest sense. As in Genesis 2:15, where God put us in the Garden to work and keep the land. That is, for humanity to behave like the apex species we are. To work the Garden of our world with an eye not only to its productivity, but also to its preservation.

Gemilut Hasadim – acts of lovingkindness. It seems that this means living with the piety and love that keeps the dignity, wellbeing, freedom, and betterment of people at the center, always.

> Of going beyond the letter of the law to show and extend kindness. It can't be that lifting others up is a separate category from Torah or Avodah, because lifting others up is central to Torah and Avodah themselves. So Gemilut Hesed has to be something distinct. A gentleness and graciousness that bridges the distance that remains even when we've otherwise

fulfilled our obligations.

The more I reflect on Shimon the Righteous' teaching, the more I find that hard lines cannot be sustained between the three pillars of the world. Learning Torah IS a kind of service, and needs to be a kind of labor, too. Torah IS Avodah. If we love it, then we have to do the hard work of making its hard passages speak to us no less than the beautiful, easily approachable ones. We are forbidden to engage in ritual matters if we tolerate - or worse, contribute to - injustice in our homes, our city, our world. The prophet Amos (5:21-22) channels God's loathing religious forms and pieties in a corrupted society. You hate "organized religion?" God hates it more. Hates it, that is, when we neglect the Gemilut Hasadim that's integral to it.

# You Say You Want a Revelation? from Beata Abraham



You are probably as enamored as I am of the Cecil B. DeMille version of The Ten Commandments in which a ripped, bearded, and glowing Charleton Heston-as-Moses dramatically descends from the mountain clutching

tablets inscripted with God's laws and delivers them to the Israelites. I don't blame you one bit, it's an incredible movie. But in spite of our love for this cinematic masterpiece, we cannot ignore the inaccuracy of events (and the very weird mangling of the Jewish characters' names) as portrayed in the film. By the time Shavuot rolls around seven weeks after Pesach, you should enter your dairy stupor well aware of the fundamental fact that the **revelation at Sinai was made to the masses standing at the base of** 

**the mountain,** not just to Charleton, I mean ... Moses.

"Moses called all of Israel and said to them: 'Hear, O Israel, the decrees and the ordinances that I speak in your ears today – learn them, and be careful to perform them. The Lord your God sealed a covenant with us at Horev [Mount Sinai]. Not with our forefathers did God seal this covenant, but with us – we who are here, all of us alive today. Face to face did God speak with you on the mountain from amid the fire.' (Deuteronomy 5:1-4)"

Why does this matter so darn much? Glad you asked.

If your very charismatic and convincing neighbor told you that over the weekend God spoke to him personally to let him know that he is a chosen prophet here on earth and only by following his teachings will you be assured a place in the world to come, would you believe him? Think you wouldn't? And yet, if you examine the origins of (continued on next page)

Which brings me to CBINT's Social Action Committee. A religious community has to engage in the loving work that the Torah teaches. In Hebrew, our house is called a *Beit K'nesset* – a gathering place. Gathering for what? For a community that's built on, and continually reinforcing, the interrelated pillars of *Torah*, *Avodah*, *and Gemilut Hasadim*. The Social Action Committee's new leaders, Don Bass, Jodie Honigman, and Felicia Miller, have extensively researched local organizations to identify some that are doing critical work *in which we can actively participate*. Hands on.

The prayers we offer day in and day out, the friendships and camaraderie we cultivate in meals and celebrations together, the learning we do at CBINT... All of this is necessary but incomplete. A Jewish community gathers also to find partners to go out and do the *Avodah* – the service to God through service to people, to society – that the *Torah* calls on us to pursue with love, with *Hesed*.

Thanks to the SAC, CBINT has partnered with:

- Pathfinders, creating ladders of opportunity for at-risk youth in Milwaukee.
- Jewish Family Services, providing an extraordinary range of social services.
- Project Return MKE, supporting and mentoring those released from a period of incarceration.
- Ovation, preserving maximum dignity and independence for Jewish elders.
- NAMI, support for people touched by Mental Illness, be it their own or that of someone close to them.

I urge all of us who are able to heed the call of the SAC and identify new volunteer service that we can do with members of our shul as members of our shul. Because our work out there is essential to our service(s) in here. Because the most Jewish space in our lives might just be the one where we're engaged in service that's preserving and rebuilding lives out there. That's the kind of work that beautifully and successfully integrates Torah, Avodah, and Gemilut Hasadim.

every major religion, the acceptance of this claim from one individual is exactly what they are founded upon.

Let's take a look. Islam was founded on the creed of Mohammed who said that God spoke to him in a cave in which he revealed the teachings contained in the Koran to him alone. In Christianity, it was Jesus; it was Joseph Smith for the Mormons, and Siddhartha Gautamo for Buddhists. Each of the world's great religions exist on the premise that they have a chosen one who heard a divine message and whose life mission then became to persuade others that God had delivered the true gospel to them alone.

No other religion in the history of the world from the beginning of time until today has made the unique claim that Judaism makes; that God gave the vision of what our divine purpose here on earth would be to more than one person. The fact that it was given to and heard by millions of men, women, and children at Mount Sinai is a palpable way in which Judaism differs from other religions. You wouldn't need to be a skeptic to question the authenticity of a revelation heard by just one person no matter how powerful and believable their testimony was. But a revelation witnessed by millions of people comes with a certain level of street cred.

The people who heard the revelation at Sinai responded to God both individually and collectively with the words of acceptance; "Na'aseh v'Nishma" – we will do and we will

listen, a consent without which the revelation could not have been completed. The radical concept that a nation would enter into a mutually agreed upon covenant rather than obey the words of an oppressive regime or follow the gospel of one prophet was unheard of at that time. Of course, trailblazing has always been our thing (weekends-inspired by Shabbat, monotheism, Justice for All-including the disadvantaged, Education for All-including women and children). We have never been slackers on the trendsetter front, and you are very welcome, world.

Modern Shavuot celebrations that usually consist of all night learning sessions fueled by a steady stream of cheesecake are a far cry from the epic party that took place at the bottom of Mount Sinai. Punctuated by thunder and lightning and mass revelry in the form of food and drink, the celebration bridged the chasm between the divine and earthly realms. We heard the voice of God. We celebrated. We became a nation bound to God by a covenant.

The Jewish people have chosen to keep the Torah and to pass those words down from generation to generation for thousands of years. No, it's not because of all of those astonishing miracles, of which there have certainly been plenty – but because we were there together when the word of God was revealed to us. It was a revelation that changed everything.
