



Problem Child *from Beata Abraham*



I am certain that, just like me, you have exemplary, virtuous children, who have only ever brought you joy and endless moments of deep kvelling.

We are very blessed indeed. But, the Torah, being a guide for the living, and therefore

aspiring to address all of the intricacies that human nature entails, has provided guidance in the event that a child is not just imperfect, but actually a major problem. I present to you, the Torah's version of the Problem Child.

"If a man have a stubborn and rebellious son, that will not hearken to the voice of his father and [not "or"] the voice of his mother and though they chasten him, will not hearken unto them, then shall his father and his mother lay hold of him and bring him out unto the elders of his city.... They shall say unto the elders of his city: This our son is stubborn and rebellious, he doth not hearken to our voice, he is a glutton and a drunkard. And all the men of his city shall stone him with stones that he die; so shalt thou put away the evil from the midst of thee; and all Israel shall hear, and fear" (Deut. 21:18-21).

Moshe, himself a father, understood just how impossible it might be for a parent to throw their hands up in defeat and give up on rehabilitating their child. According to a Midrash, when God transcribed the verses explaining how to handle a rebellious child to Moshe at *Har Sinai*, he refused to write them

down.

"Write!" God told him. "What's the problem?"

"I can't," responded Moshe. "No parent will ever obey this law, under any circumstances. Can we just leave it out completely?"

"Moshe," said God. "You are pretty smart, but I'm still smarter. It goes in."

Nowadays, wayward children are more likely to end up on a talk show blaming their parents for their misdeeds than at the mercy of the judgment of their townspeople, so the harsh decree from the Torah may seem disproportionate to our modern ears. And, of course, the problem of "problem children" is not a modern phenomenon. It is woven into the fabric of human experience and the Torah has no shortage of examples of rebellious offspring.

1. Cain and Abel: The story of Cain and Abel (Genesis 4:1-16) is the very first instance of the ultimate toxic triumvirate; sibling rivalry, jealousy, and violence ending in Cain ultimately committing fratricide.

2. Ishmael: Hagar's son Ishmael (Genesis 16) is portrayed as a taunting bully to Isaac, and his very existence, a threat to his half brother's legitimacy. His treatment of Isaac is so harsh that Sarah casts him out to wander the desert with his mother.

3. Reuben: In (Genesis 35:22), Reuben, Jacob's eldest son, commits an act of incest with Bilhah, his father's concubine. This act not only leads to a loss of Jacob's favor but also complicates family dynamics.

- 4. The Sons of Eli:** In (Samuel 2:12-17), the sons of Eli, Hophni, and Phinehas are described as corrupt priests who exploit their positions for personal gain. Their moral failings lead to severe repercussions for their family and community.

It may not surprise you that there is no actual recorded instance of a rebellious child being stoned to death for their misdeeds. This could be because our sages were as horrified by the harsh decree in the Torah as we are, and went to great lengths (Sanhedrin 68a-72a) to interpret this text in a way that would make it utterly impossible to carry out. Well done, sages!

Working overtime to find ways to make a stoning death impossible, the sages concluded that since the parents in the text are required to come together to bring the child to the elders and state “he does not hear OUR voice” (Deuteronomy 18:20), this means that not only must the parents be in agreement on bringing their child to justice, but that *their voices must literally sound exactly alike*. Pretty sure I have never met parents who could meet this requirement, and neither have you.

According to the Torah verse, the parents must also declare “Our child is a glutton and a drunkard,” and since these are probably subjective metrics, the sages in their quest for insurmountable obstacles to the stoning death, interpreted it to mean that the child cannot be considered a “*ben sorer umoreh*” until he steals a *specific* quantity of meat and wine from his parents’ home, but even that is not enough. He must consume those things *outside* of the home (based on the questionable premise that overeating and drinking too much outside of your home is far more difficult).

All of which brings us back to the most bewildering question of all. Why does the Torah tell us to stone an errant child to death by the townspeople in the first place? Surely there is a better solution.

Glad you asked. According to the Talmud, there are two possible reasons.

The first interpretation assumes that we

humans possess something called the “power of prediction.”

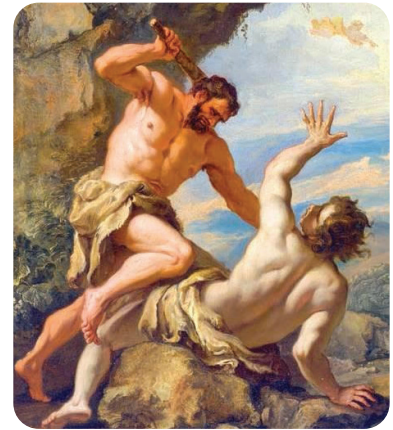
That we are confident in our ability to make predictions of future behavior, based on current behavior and therefore must

intervene in the present to avoid terrible things in the future. That it is our obligation to prevent the inevitable spiral of the rebellious child into a rebellious adult who will be a greater threat to the world someday. Better that he be put to death now, than be allowed to take someone’s life later.

The second interpretation is a bit different.

According to the Talmud, this so-called “‘rebellious child’ never was and never will be” (Sanhedrin 71a). There are too many requirements to be met before the rebellious child could be prosecuted. This interpretation means that instead of a law that must be followed, the verses are meant as a sort of cautionary tale, or Torah for the sake of studying (*drosh v’kabel skhar*). The hope is that the expectation of such a harsh fate will deter the youth contemplating rebelliousness and set him on the path to righteousness lest he suffer a terrible fate. Preventative promise of punishment.

Far be it from me to suggest that you strategically whip out the scary verses in the Torah referring to what can happen to rebellious children at your Thanksgiving dinner table this year. I am sure there are better ways to deter any young guests who might have plans of waywardness. I’m just saying that if you do, you would probably be in the best company of our ancient foreparents who had the same hopes for their children that we do today; that they grow up to be righteous inhabitants of the earth. Of course if you do find yourself needing reinforcements, as always, the Torah has your back.

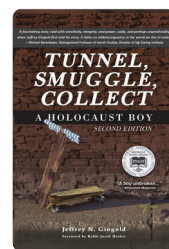
